Grant of land to National Institute of Unani Medicine,
Bangalore.

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Q.D.R. NO. SWL 76 SDR 07, BANGALORE, DATED:- 13th APRIL 1983.

REASON:-

- 1) D.O.Letter No.HFW/HIS/300/PA/87 dated 13th November 1987 from the Secretary to Govt., Health and Family Welfare Department.
- 2) D.O.Letter No.CRC/1006/87-88 dated 6/2/1988 from the Chairman, Central Relief Committee, Bangalore.

REMARKS:-

In the letter read at(1)above the Secretary to Govt., Health and Family Welfare Dept., has stated that in the year 1982 the Govt., of India decided to establish a National Institute of Unani Medicine in Bangalore with the assistance of Government of Karnataka. Govt., of Karnataka had agreed to provide 70 Acres of land for establishing the National Institute of Unani Medicine and for raising a herb garden.

The Central Relief Committee(Beggar's colony) is having 55-Acre, 36-Guntas of un-used land in Survey No.61 and 62 on Mysore Road, Bangalore, in Sri Gauda Kavalu village, Yeshwanthpur Hobli, Bangalore North Taluk, which is proposed to be made available to the National Institute of Unani Medicine.

The National Institute of Unani Medicine is a prestigious academic Institution which would provide teaching and research facilities in the Unani system of Medicine. This scheme with an outlay of about Rs.4.00 crores envisages establishment of a 200 Beds Hospital also. It is felt that the Hospital would be very useful for the inmates of the Beggars colony. The Central Relief Committee would be still left with nearly 120 acres of land even after parting with the land proposed to be transferred, which would be sufficient for all the projects and plans of the Central Relief Committee.

In the letter read at(2)above the Chairman, Central Relief Committee has agreed to release the said lands in favour of the National Institute of Unani Medicine subject to the following conditions:-

- 1) Free treatment shall be provided to the inmates of the Nirashritara Parihara Kendra, Bangalore (Beggars) on priority.
- 2) Five beds shall be reserved for the treatment of inmates of Nirashritara Parihara Kendra.

Establishment of the National Institute of Unani Medicine at Bangalore - sanctions to the

Letter No.R.13011/2,81-ISM/V cl.II, dated 22.11.1984 from the Under Secretary to Government of India, Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, New Delhi.

The question of setting up of the National Institute of Unani Medicine at Bangalore was under consideration of Government in 1980. The proposal involves sharing of the expenditure to the extent of 2/3rd by the Government of India and 1/3rd by State Government. The total cost of the project works out to Rs.363.60 lakhs which includes both recurring and non-recurring expenditure.

Though the matter was taken up with the Government of India during the past 3 years, a task force consisting of representatives of the State and Central Governments was constituted and they have also examined all the details. The details of the project as furnished by the Task force are indicated in the annexures.

The Government of India have now decided to establish the National Institute of Unani Medicine at Bangalore in collaboration with the State Government on the following terms and conditions:-

- (i) The Government of Karnataka shall earmark 50 acres of land in the Bangalore University Campus for establishment of the Institute and this would be provided free of cost for the institute;
- (ii) provide about 20 acres of additional land along the banks of the rivulet passing through the campus for development of a Herbs Garden on the same basis as mentioned in (i) above;
- (iii) share one-third of the costs of construction, equipments and all recurring and non-recurring expenditure (of) the National Institute, while the remaining two-thirds shall be the share of the Central Government. This sharing arrangement would be reviewed on completion of the Project.

The financial implication is as under:

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Government of Karnataka shall earmark 50 acres of land in the Bangalore University Campus for establishing the Institute and this would be provided free of cost to the Institute;

provide about 20 acres of additional land along the banks of the rivulet passing through the campus for development of a Herbs Garden on the same basis as mentioned in (1) above;

share one-third of the cost of construction, equipments and all recurring and non-recurring expenditure of the National Institute, while the remaining two-thirds shall be the share of the Central Government. This sharing arrangement would be reviewed on completion of the project.

The financial implication is as under:

After 5 years during which period this project is estimated to be completed, the recurring expenditure is estimated to be Rs. 30.30 lakhs per year on the part of the State Government.

- v) provide temporary accommodation for the office, teaching and hostel etc., to the extent of 4 to 5 thousand sq. feet to enable the starting of the project;
- v) make available the Unani wards in the existing State Hospital of Indigenous Medicine to the students of the National Institute till such time as the Institute Hospital is build up; and
- vi) the admissions to the Institute will be done on an all-India basis.

This order issues with the concurrence of both Planning Department and the Finance Department vide their U.O. Note Nos. Planning 0210 dated 15.12.1980 and No. FS 4058/8 dated 16.12.1980 (Exp-III/80, dated 24.12.1980).
